FROM THE MINISTER

Sunday, March 11, will be the occasion of my ordination. Several people have wondered what that means and how it is different from being fellowshipped or from my installation in September. My short answer has been, "At my installation I married the congregation. At my ordination I will marry the universe." Perhaps I can provide a clearer explanation.

There are four elements that mark preparation for and entry into Unitarian Universalist ministry:

1) There is academic and hands on training as provided through a theological school, a chaplaincy program, and a teaching congregation. Accordingly, I completed my Master of Divinity in 2005 being sure I covered all UU requirements beyond those of my seminary.

2) In order to become a fellowshipped UU minister, basically meaning to join the professional association of UU ministers and obtain denominational standing, I needed to undergo vocational testing that included some psychological evaluation, provide documentation to and go before the Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC) of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). If you pass muster with the MFC, you enter Preliminary Fellowship, a probationary period, before receiving Final Fellowship following three years of evaluation. In October of 2005, I received Preliminary Fellowship from the UUA.

3) A person must be called to some sort of ministry as you called me to be your minister in June of 2006. An installation affirms and celebrates the covenant between a congregation and the minister they called to serve them.

4) Ordination is a sacred event through which the title "Reverend" is conveyed. Once ordained I will not only be recognized by the congregation and the UUA as a minister, but also in accord with certain State laws and by other denominations.

Within the UUA, installation and ordination is in the hands of a local congregation. No greater denominational

authority dictates who a congregation may call to be their minister. However, the UUA does provide the service of credentialing through the fellowship process.

There are certain traditions associated with ordination in general and within the UUA specifically. There is an early Christian custom rooted in a biblical moment when the apostles lay hands on seven who were chosen to further spread the apostles' ministry. Accordingly, you will see this laying on of hands on the minister or priest about to be ordained to convey this succession from the apostles, the Holy Spirit, or what have you. In other denominations, only bishops or other clergy will lay hands upon the minister. However, in UU ordinations, it is the entire gathered assembly who lay hands on the minister symbolizing that the "power comes from the people" and from the interdependent web of relationships of which we are a part of and supports us.

Another tradition with more recent roots at installations and ordinations is passing the plate for the UUA's Living Tradition Fund. The Living Tradition fund was established by the UUA to support UU ministry in three ways:

- Need-based scholarships for theological students (I was a beneficiary - - seminary can cost \$30,000);
- New minister assistance to reduce the burden of high educational debt; and
- Grants to ministers for emergency assistance.

A wonderful UU minister, The Reverend Jennifer Slade will be the speaker at my ordination. My parents and siblings will be there. I hope to celebrate with you all as well at my ordination.

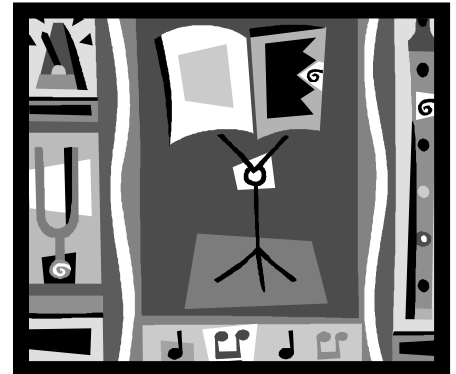

FROM THE BOARD

FEBRUARY 2007 BOARD REPORTS

Jennifer Gilbreath, President, reported that during the month of January she assisted with various tasks associated with Sunday Services, Buildings and Grounds, and Membership. She also updated our general and membership data with UUA and UU World Magazine. Compared to last year, our RE numbers went up from 12 to 16 and average attendance went up from 41 to 46. This is good!

Vice-President Joan Liston organized the January 9 "Lunch with Pat" at the Harwell's with 21 people attending. The next one will be on February 13 at the Liston's home to discuss Joseph Campbell's writings about world religion.

The newsletter list has been reviewed and people who have not attended recently (except for out of town supporters) will receive a post card with the next newsletter giving them the opportunity to let us know whether or not they want to continue to receive the newsletter. Joan will help with the production of the February newsletter.

The Long Range Planning Committee met twice to work on accomplishments and goals for the canvass brochure.

Pat Guthmann Haresch reported that January was a busy month with more meeting than usual. She updated the Board regarding her upcoming Ordination, Sunday, March 11. She noted several community involvements including discussions with the Jewish Groups concerning joint events and she will be leading a community Lenten service at OBX Presbyterian, Wednesday, March 21 at noon. She will be away the last weekend in February.

Finance Committee Chair, Melissa

McCarter's report indicated that the committee will be working on the UUCOB Budget and canvass mailer in the next few weeks. The mailers should go out by March 1.

Susan Lawrence, Chairperson of Communications did some minor database work and worked on the newsletter which was distributed at the meeting. Her work was limited due to the early arrival of baby daughter Giana.

Dennis Tromba reported that it was a slow month for Buildings and Grounds, but he repaired a leaky outside faucet and built a new shelf. He plans to continue discussions concerning outdoor plantings with the Religious Education committee.

Laura Gilson described work being done on developing rituals for the Religious Education program. They have introduced a children's chalice lighting, saying, and song. The children also share joys and concerns and have their own offering. The children will determine ideas for causes for which they will raise money. Additional child care is being provided and interviews are underway for the child care worker position. Michel Sanchez is developing a Peace Curriculum which will include lessons, games, and songs and a peace pole.

Membership, chaired by Burnham Gould reported that Sunday attendance during January averaged 36 adults and 11 children. Barbara Goulet joined the committee as Chair of the Caring Subcommittee. Because of conflicts with the Congregation's other social activities involving suppers during February and March, the fourth Friday socials will be temporarily suspended.

The Treasurer's Report, presented by Chuck Purser, reported a shortfall in January of \$357. For the year to date, we have completed 58.3% of our time, spent 58.8% of our budget, and have collected 59.7% of the planned income. His projection is that we should com-

plete the year close to target.

Share the Plate for January collected \$273.05 to be sent to Save the Children. An additional \$53.60 has been received for Guest at Your Table and will be sent to UUA this month.

BOARD ACTION ITEMS

1. UUCOB Member Bob Green introduced and demonstrated a computer application that can be used to obtain and update membership demographics, opinions and characteristics, and to evaluate the performance of the board and church committees. Board members had responded to a web-based questionnaire prior to the meeting. Results were reviewed online and discussed during the meeting with Bob.

2. On April 7, 2007 (the Saturday before Easter) there will be a Celebration of Women Service that is being coordinated by the Jewish Group that meets at UUCOB on Friday nights. The service will be at the Meetinghouse and will include a Women's Seder. We will participate and this joint event is open to all, not just women.

3. UUCOB will host the Dare County Ministerial Association Meeting on March 1, 2007. Pat Guthmann Haresch will do the Lenten services for them on March 21. The Lenten services are open to all and are held at the Presbyterian Church in Kill Devil Hills.

4. March 11, 2007 has been chosen as the date for Pat Guthmann Haresch's ordination.

5. The board agreed to continue to waive the building use fee for concerts at UUCOB when the musician(s) will be providing music for a Sunday Service. Donations collected at these concerts would be shared with non-profit organizations or used for outreach.

OBCUUPS CORNER

Eostre Ritual at 6:00 PM with a potluck to follow Please join us as we celebrate spring's arrival!

The "Temporum Ratione" or "The Reckoning of Time" by the Northumbrian monk and scholar the Venerable Bede (673-735) is a work that covers the solar and lunar cycles, the basis for various calendars, and how to calculate the date of the Christian Easter ceremony. Bede included a chapter called 'The English Months'.

It begins:

"In olden times the English people - for it did not seem fitting that I should speak of other nations' observance of the year and yet be silent about my own nation's - calculated their months according to the course of the Moon.

Hence, after the manner of the Greeks and the Romans, [the months] take their name from the Moon, for the Moon is called mona and the month monath.... The first month, which the Latins call January, is Giuli; February is called Solmonath; March Hrethmonath; April, Eosturmonath [...] Eosturmonath has a name which is now translated 'Paschal month' and which was once called after a goddess of theirs named Eostre, in whose honour feasts were celebrated in that month. Now they designate that Paschal season by her name, calling the joys of the new rite by the time-honoured name of the old observance."

In "Teutonic Mythology", Jacob Grimm tells us that the Anglo-

Saxon name Eostre is related to Old High German adverb ostar expressing movement toward the rising sun. "Ostara, Eostre seems therefore to have been a divinity of the radiant dawn, of upspringing light, a spectacle that brings joy and blessing.."

*Zeno (circa 490BC) argued that if a tortoise was given a head start (say 10 minutes and the tortoise is traveling at 0.1 MPH), that a hare traveling at 30 MPH could never catch the tortoise.

His argument went like this: in the 10 minute head start, the tortoise will travel a certain distance, x . In the time it takes the hare to get from the starting point to x , the tortoise will travel to y . In the time it takes the hare to get from x to y the tortoise will travel to z . This process will go on an infinite number of times, hence the hare will never catch the tortoise.

ZENOS PARADOXES OF MOTION AND THE MYTH OF THE CONTINUUM



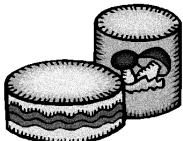
On March 18 I will present a lecture on the cognitive nature of mathematics titled Zeno's Paradoxes of Motion and the myth of the continuum. My topic springs forth from a ten year study and utter fascination with the logical foundations of mathematics. I am confident in the far reaching importance of such an approach to understanding our shared human intellect. I am much less sanguine about sparking interest in the audience about such a foreboding topic as mathematics. I chose the Zeno pathway because this logical paradox has enjoyed a very long standing popularity among mathematicians and philosophers alike and thus information on this topic may readily be accessed on the Web. I would have a bit less of a mountain to climb on Sunday if interested parties have a little time to ruminate on these ideas before the eighteenth of March.

Past experience has shown that the mere mention of the word mathematics tends to make others glaze over with apprehension or disinterest. The topic seems inaccessible to those without a certain comfort level in the world of numbers. Here one need only possess a rudimentary knowledge of mathematics in order to follow this classic argument. In fact those in the audience with expert mathematical training may find it difficult to see the forest for the trees in this context. On the other hand without the active power of an inquiring intellect no lasting effect could be forthcoming here; so a merely pro forma attendance is not advised for this presentation.
