3/23 A Life Affirming Theology

When Mel Gibson's movie, "The Passion" came out, it created quite a stir at Rev. Pat's seminary (a merged United Church of Christ and American Baptist seminary with a large number of Unitarian Universalists). There was some debate, but for the most part the professors and student body were disappointed, while some were outraged because the director chose to focus on the suffering, blood, and gore of Jesus' final days, as opposed to Jesus' teachings. One professor summed up the discussion in this way, that some read the Bible and see a theology of blood, death and sacrifice. Others see a message of love, peace, justice, and hope: a life-affirming theology. Historically, as you might imagine, Unitarians and Universalists have been on the life-affirming side of the fence. Rev. Pat will explore what some of the ancient teachings of a wandering rabbi and his followers might mean for us today.

FROM THE MINISTER

Lent is soul work or should be. . .

Lent affirms the intrinsic value of each soul.

And if you affirm its value its supreme beauty and worth at the core,

Then you can see the necessity for the discipline [of] its care. . .

It means getting at the worth of the self,

Sorting out what is dead and gone by.

Nurturing what is left and to come.

It means centering in on the most important and clearing the debris away from it.

We have some soul work to do - - for ourselves and for one another.

Lent affirms the intrinsic value of each soul.

And if you affirm its value, its supreme beauty and worth are at the core,

For Christians, forty days before Easter mark the Lenten season. At the end of April will be the week long Jewish Pesach or Passover. These are religious observations that include fasting, ritual, and reflection. Among Christians and within pre-Christian traditions, this time of Spring that is now and still to come, was a time of preparation. Before Christianity, many peoples around the globe practiced a period of fasting, even a forty-day period of fasting either to honor the return of the sun or of Spring and the "rebirth" of the land. The word, "Lent" itself comes from an Anglo-Saxon word: 'lencten', meaning spring, or lengthening as the days were beginning to lengthen. Perhaps Springtime was a natural time for fasting, a lean time when the winter stores were almost depleted before the growing season.

From time to time, I find myself longing to create a space in my life to observe a period of fasting and

abstinence, solitude and reflection. Fasting and abstinence partly as a response to the uneven balance of hunger and plenty within the world. But also, I have longed to do the kind of soul work that is suggested in the words of Bruce Clary. To gather up and clear away the spiritual baggage and distractions that clutter my heart and soul. And to prepare a place for the coming again of new life and clarity. To try to avoid simply tumbling again into the busyness of the growing season and the activities of the warmer months without much reflection and intention. Otherwise, it is so easy to be blown about again by the winds of Spring, through the whirlwinds of a busy Summer, and land in the Fall wondering again this year, "where did the summer go?"

This is a time of preparation for a season of steady rebirth and reawakening of an abundant power that returns each year. Let us prepare a place for the soul and possibility of transformation within each one of us and may this renewal flow outward to others and the greater world.

The direction of attention is a choice.

Fear can dominate the mind

Binding it like a straitjacket.

Or love can unbind it and open it

To resource and opportunity.

The soil of the mind can be watered with kindness.

The thorns can be removed one by one

To allow another close enough

To appreciate the buds ready to flower.

Great possibilities await us

Even if all we can see is the cliff before us.

The grandeur of life, of which we are a part,

Scatters rainbows in every direction,

Our current church year was 58% complete at the end of January and we had collected 55% of budgeted income while having paid 56% of anticipated expenses.

Now we refer to our participatory soliciting as the Annual Giving Campaign.
