FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings, UUCOB Members and Friends! The word "balance" at UUCOB has been on my mind and in several conversations recently. What I mean by the word balance is our level of activity and how it relates to our UUCOB community and the volunteers who support that community.

For me, balance at UUCOB is comparable to compromise in a relationship with a partner. The concept is quite obvious and essential in healthy relationships. Yet it takes many hands just to keep our doors open, our congregation appropriately administered, our children

engaged, and our Sundays superb. So what happens to the ideas and opportunities we are offered so often? You will find them all around you: in the newsletter, the weekly email announcements and our new bulletin boards in the meeting house (thanks Jody!).

I encourage you to participate in what works for you. Our congregational life fully depends on our volunteers' participation. Just remember the balance, because our congregational life depends on that, too.

MUSIC MUSIC MUSIC

We hope to have a diversity of music at our Sunday Services: Bach to blues to folk to earth-tradition chants and more. And we have different musical elements during the service: The Prelude, Offertory and Postlude are opportunities for the congregation to reflect. This is the time when we normally use what you might call 'performance' music. We also have congregational singing - usually our opening and closing songs. And then there is our every Sunday singing of Go Now in Peace (once through) during the children's reflection and the Doxology after the gathering of the offering. The singings of these songs are regular elements in our order of service.

Music at Services is under the direction of either our Minister Pat or the Program Chair Nancy. Generally there is a lay leader assigned to each service. What and how much the Lay Leader does depends on their interests, talents, and the needs of the congregation. Guidelines are provided with room for individual creativity and energy. When there is a Guest Speaker, Nancy or the Lay Leader will discuss music needs and requests with the Speaker. Selections are made one to two weeks before the service at the very latest. The Order of Service (i.e.

Bulletin or Program) is formatted and printed on Thursday.

Will you help bring more joy and spirit to our music? Here are some ways:

1. Sing out with joy!
2. Join an impromptu choir formed at the beginning of an opening or closing song.
3. Volunteer to stand in front and lead the singing. Some of us do better with someone to follow
4. Volunteer once, twice, or regularly to play the piano for Opening and Closing Songs.
5. Volunteer to perform for the prelude, offertory and/or postlude. This could be instrumental, singing, chanting or dancing. A 2005 survey showed growing churches use more percussion instruments.
6. Let Nancy Proctor or Rev. Pat know of any musicians that we might ask to come to our services to perform or play. A small honorarium may be available. music@uucob.org or minister@uucob.org.

FROM THE BOARD

MARCH 2007 BOARD REPORTS

Jennifer Gilbreath, President, reported that she participated in Sunday Services and UUCOB events throughout February. The weekly email list was culled; please contact her if you or someone you know at UUCOB is not receiving these announcements. She also spent some time working out some process questions with the RE Committee, the Committee on Ministry and Finance Committee.

Vice-President Joan Liston has kept the church mailing list up-to-date and produced the last two newsletters since our last board meeting. 92 newsletters have been sent.

She has served as a lay leader this month and she and Dick hosted "Lunch with Pat" on February 13. She has been organizing home hospitality for the Ordination Sunday.

Minister Pat Guthmann Haresch asked the Board for guidance with respect to when to present an Adult RE offering on congregational social action. She also noted the Dare County Ministers' Association is organizing a "CROP Walk" to occur this coming October on Roanoke Island. The World Council of Churches help people put these on to raise awareness about world and local hunger and to raise money to help feed the hungry and combat the problem. The money goes to international relief projects, but 20-25% goes to local charities. Does UUCOB want to be involved? Pat also plans to be away the weekend following ordination. Finally, she listed accomplishments she's observed at UUCOB since she has arrived.

1) A reformed and active RE Committee offering consistency and good programs to our children with

ideas for further serving the youth.

2) Shared activities and events with the Jewish Congregation who meet under our roof.

3) Movement towards a congregational model/method for social action.

4) Manageable growth with some offerings and recognition of new members and friends.

5) The Caring Committee has been revitalized. There has been more participation by members and friends in Sunday morning music. Finally, Pat has been involved with community activities and organizations.

Finance Committee Chairperson, Melissa McCarter's report indicated that the committee has been working on the canvass mailer and these should go out on March 8. A new lease has been sent to Feline Hope. The Ministerial Compensation Review Committee met in February and recommended that UUCOB upgrade Pat to a 2/3 time minister. This will benefit our congregation greatly and will entail a budget increase of \$5,307. Since this year's budget will not require expenses for the search committee, moving expenses, and interim speakers she feels confident we can move Pat to 2/3 time as long as we are successful in attaining good pledge amounts. The additional time, about 6 hours per week, would allow her to expand adult RE offerings, outreach activities and ministerial services. Melissa will meet with Pat this Thursday to discuss the actual kickoff event and game planning.

Susan Lawrence, Chairperson, reported business as usual in Communications. She will be working on the Canvas brochure, setting up the membership database, and updating the website. She is also in the process of transferring the site to a new server.

Dennis Tromba, Buildings and Grounds had nothing to report this month.

Laura Gilson reported that the Religious Education committee has preliminarily hired Elena Jaramillo as our UUCOB Childcare Provider. The process of full hiring is in the works. The Peace Program curriculum was very successful, as are the children's weekly rituals and offertory. The greatest challenge facing the RE program is manpower, so please consider volunteering.

Membership, chaired by Burnham Gould reported that average Sunday attendance during February was somewhat lower than the previous two months: 32 adults, 10 children, 42 total. Greeters included Sherrie Lemnois, Katy Marchello, Lori Cash, and Laura Gilson. Three new members were recognized during the Sunday service on February 4. Jody Holcomb coordinated the very successful Chocolate Auction held on February 10. All those who participated thoroughly enjoyed themselves. About \$600 was raised for the church. The Lunch with Pat, hosted by Dick and Joan Liston on February 13, also was very successful with 15 people participating.

The Treasurer's Report, presented by Chuck Purser, reported a shortfall in February of \$1,266. For the year to date, we have completed 67% of our time, spent 67% of our budget, and have collected 63% of the planned income. We will need to focus on lagging pledges and remaining fund raising to finish the year on target.

Share the Plate for February added \$276 to the Allen Valpey Emergency Fund and a check for \$273.05 been sent for Save the Children from the January collections. He is working on a system that will allow for all collections to be made by members of the Finance Committee while record keeping and disbursements would be made by the Treasurer.

BOARD ACTION ITEMS

1. There will be a new series of classes for prospective members. The classes have been tentatively set for July. It was noted that signing a pledge card is a prerequisite for membership.

2. The Board agreed to tentatively move forward with two new groups: A Peace Meditation Group and a Divorce Support Group. The former will fall under the auspices of the Program Committee, with the latter under the Caring Committee which is part of Membership. Guidelines for such group were proposed and will be developed into a policy with appropriate forms and procedures. The Peace Meditation Group has received approval, with the Divorce Support Group's approval pending their presentation to the board at the April meeting.

3. An adult Religious Education series on congregational social action will be scheduled to begin in April or May. The programs will be based on the work of UU minister Dick Gilbert and will be presented by the Rev. Pat Guthmann Haresch.

4. Pat will adjust her posted office hours to Monday and Thursday mornings with flexibility to continue with noontime meetings and appointments.

5. The Service Auction is being planned for the first weekend in June. Susan Lawrence will coordinate this project again this year.

6. The Board supported having Elena Jaramillo continue under contract as our Childcare Provider while a background check is conducted. Once that is complete her status could be changed to "employee".
