FROM THE MINISTER

For those of you who missed the FUSS Outer Banks cruise on Sunday, June 10, it was a fun Sunday service planned by I believe our "Cruise Director," Nancy Proctor. Besides being fun, it was an opportunity to look back on the year and think about the many contributions of time, service and caring from really everyone at UUCOB and look forward to those who will be assuming new leadership roles. Such a passionate and dedicated group.

In researching the cruise and boating theme, Nancy discovered the term "Harbor Pilot" and realized in the boating universe this seemed liked the right title for me. Here are my reflections that I shared June 10 about being your Harbor Pilot:

"It takes many hands to steer a ship safely through the troubled waters of life. In this journey, don't just think of me as your minister, but also as your Harbor Pilot.

According to wikipedia, I help guide ships through the narrow, shallow, and dangerous coastal waters between a harbor and the open sea. I am a licensed or you could say a fellowshipped guide to help you along your journey. I am a Master Mariner with experience in these kinds of harbors known as Unitarian Universalist congregations.

I help to pilot a vessel safely in the harbor, but legally the master, or I guess the Board of Trustees remain in command of the ship. You all are in charge. It's your boat. Harbor pilots, like myself, are advisers only.

Normally I will join an incoming ship at sea and help it negotiate the tricky coastal waters. I meet you where you are in your journey and use whatever skills I have to help you safely through the tides, the swells, currents, depths, and shoals that might not be readily identifiable without a helpful guide. Even a slight error in judgment could be dangerous, could cause damage of the vessel, the psyche, heart and soul.

You called me for this work just about a year ago. And I couldn't be more pleased to be with a crew such as this. It takes all hands to steer a ship through all sorts of weather and shifting breezes and tides.

Here are some quick rules of thumb to run through as we make our way on this journey. These are the Top Ten Lessons From Noah's Ark [adapted from various sources on the Internet]:

10. Don't miss the boat.
9. Don't listen to critics; just get on with the job that needs to be done.
8. Stay fit. When you're 600 years old, like Noah, someone may ask

you to do something big. In other words, take care of yourself so you are prepared for anything.

7. Just remember, the Ark was built by amateurs; the Titanic by professionals. In other words, don't worry about not being a professional, we appreciate all that you do here.
 6. Plan ahead. It wasn't raining when Noah built the Ark.
 5. When you're stressed, just float for awhile. It will be okay.
 4. Just remember, we are all in the same boat.
 3. Speed isn't an advantage. The snails had a place on board the Ark, just as the cheetahs did. Take your time.
 2. Build your future on higher ground.
- And the Number One lesson from Noah's Ark. For safety's sake, travel in pairs. Or in our case, at UUCOB, just remember you need never travel on this journey in life alone. We have each other. Blessed Be.

COUNCIL ON COMMUNITY OUTREACH FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE

Have you noticed how frequently Hale's and Chicago's words have surfaced on our Sunday readings and bulletin blurbs? Seems that, being UU types, we itch to do "the something", so that "all will share equally in Earth's abundance."

But, being UU types, we're already widely committed. E. g.: in the George Smith years we had a standing Social Action Committee, but it had no members! Justice concerns rose and fell ad hoc. Later, CUUPS initiated a social action component, but it involved only 3 or 4 of us. Last fall, Rev. Pat adumbrated a forthcoming UUCOB structure -- and now forth it hath come.

On 5/20 and 6/10, Pat facilitated noon conversations on how to approach this most effectively, using ideas from the UUA Social Justice Empowerment Handbook and from Rev. Richard Gilbert's book *The Prophetic Imperative*.

We talked about how a focus group could focus us – through:

- Research, to make sure we've got the facts right;
- Study, to inform ourselves of the facts and the solutions;
- Joining / Modeling, to see who's already on this, to add our significant drop or bucketful, and learn what works best, from their experience;
- Education, to get the word out to the congregation and to the community;
- Follow-Through, so that all of

the above should come to some good end, affecting the world through acting, locally; and

- Assessment: Is this project working? Are we doing anything effective? Have we done all we reasonably can? Shall we re-up for another 6 mos., or let this one go and pursue another topic?

"Acting" could involve differing ways each of our members and friends could contribute: our time; \$; telephoning / writing / e-mailing; physical work; spreading the word by conversation and by speaking formally to other groups.

So, how to open this up for the whole UUCOB fellowship? There's the newsletter, notes in Sunday bulletins, a church wall bulletin board, Sunday announcements and lectern presentations, e-mails, printed handouts – all on-going.

But, given the needs of the whole world, how to focus on "the somethings" do-able?

Project topics we raised: race relations; intolerance & conflict resolution; marriage equality; immigration policy / justice for immigrants; disaster / emergency issues; "greenness" (environment / ecology / pollution / waste).

All of these are world issues that have local components for us to tackle.

How to find what are the biggies, at present, for the UUCOB?

We decided to narrow it down to three topics, and to present these so the congregation could vote (à how many were most inclined to get behind what), with a fourth fill-in-the-blank slot for "what other topic fuels YOUR action engine?" We'd have a Sunday service paper "bal-

NOTES FROM THE BOARD

June 2, 2007 Meeting Action Items

Previous business: The Service Auction was a success with over \$4,000 raised for UUCOB. The board sent a big thanks to all who participated and special thanks to Susan Lawrence for her ever awesome coordination of the event.

New business: The board discussed ideas and possible focus for the incoming board, with Pat offering many new ideas.

Dennis Tromba and Jennifer Gilbreath will work on ideas for the

yard sale to take place in late summer/fall 2008.

There are currently two positions unfilled on the Board: Secretary and Membership Chair. Some discussion took place about how to manage those vacancies.

The UUA Ministerial Fellowship Committee requires that all ministers go through a probationary period before receiving Final Fellowship. An evaluation is to be prepared by the board, the Committee on Ministry, and the minister prepares a Self Evaluation. Jennifer will initiate the process. The material is tentatively

due to UUA by August 15.

Nancy Proctor reminded the board that the after church brunch on the second Sunday of each month will be a "Simple Second Sunday Brunch". Everyone is invited to bring simple foods to share rather than one or two people having full responsibility.

lot", plus a take-home-and-bring-back one and an e-mail one for others not present that day.

Ergo, on Sunday, Aug. 1, three of us will each make a 5 minute presentation, saying why that topic's relevant, why it matters to us personally, its place in the world picture and the local picture, and subdivisions (for action focus) each would have. So the congregation could also indicate which angle of their chosen biggie they were most inclined to pursue.

The Council – see heading; better name is up for grabs; various versions had included "Service" and "Action", but I gave up trying to shoehorn them in – would meet regularly (e.g. monthly, after Sunday services) to keep project in focus & to assess progress.

The "Community" component is both because acting locally seems to most effectively help globally, and because we'd like the Outer Banks to see that we're here, and that we're really working to be a positive force in this wonderful web.

Each topic could involve all of us, littlest kids to oldest codgers.

Whatever biggie topic we focus on

won't exclude action, by any or all of us, on any other topics that rise.

But here are the three we winnowed down to, for us to choose as our starting project, with some of their sub levels:

Affordable Living

subs:Housing; Wages;
Transportation; Health Care)

Substance Abuse

subs: Community impact;
Prevention, awareness (RE concerns); Help for those involved;
Tie-in / help with other local initiatives (AA, Al-Anon, Dare CASA)

Ocean Conservation / Preservation

subs: Seafood (sustainable, safe to eat; local commercial fishery); Beach conditions (sweeps, anti litter campaign); Pollution (local runoff, etc.); Wetlands issues (maintenance, zoning laws)

Plus, of course, whatever comes up from that fourth fill-in-the-blank slot!

And then... And then ... each will share in moving us closer to towards "each sharing equally in Earth's abundance".

UUA Board Seeks Volunteers for 3 Committees

The Committee on Committees of the UUA Board of Trustees is now accepting applications to fill the following vacancies:

1. General Assembly Planning Committee: One board-appointed position, for a two-year term beginning June 25, 2007. Qualities desired include experience with meeting or event planning, some technical expertise and dedication to creating an inclusive anti-racist, anti-oppressive, multicultural gathering of UU leaders.
2. Commission on Appraisal: One vacancy, beginning June 25, 2007, to be appointed to complete the last two-years of a current elected term. The Commission is in the midst of an intensive project so any applicant should be willing and able to participate as fully and quickly as possible. Experience with vibrant UU communities, particularly as a minister, would be

helpful for the Commission, as would diverse age (under 50), ethnic or racial perspectives. Following completion of the current term, the appointee would be encouraged to apply for election to a complete six year term.

3. Committee on Socially Responsible Investing: One vacancy, beginning immediately. Applicants should have competence and experience with professional socially responsible investing, an awareness of social justice initiatives within our Association and a commitment to deeper understanding of the work of anti-racism, anti-oppression and multiculturalism."

As we strive to live out our values and reflect who we are as a community, the Board is intentionally looking for applicants from various ages, races, ethnicities, genders and sexual orientations.
